WE ARE COMMITTED TO HIGH STANDARDS

The Texas Academy of Veterinary Practice, an organization within the Texas Veterinary Medical Association (TVMA), exists to promote and maintain the highest standards of veterinary care through continuing education. It was founded in 1970 to encourage participation in continuing education, which was not yet required for veterinarians, while also recognizing those with a sincere commitment to it.

As active members of the Academy, our veterinarians are required to obtain 150-hours of approved continuing education within a three year period, far above the state-mandated 17 hours for annual license renewal. Members must also be veterinarians engaged in the practice of veterinary medicine; members in good standing of TVMA and one or more local veterinary medical associations; and of high moral and professional character.
